The City Council held a work session discussion on Tuesday, April 12th, to discuss allocation amounts for CDBG, ESG, HOME, HOPWA, ADDI applications. The attached resolution formally adopts the Council's funding allocations, listed in Exhibit A.

The following questions were raised in the Council's discussion on CDBG regarding specific applicants' operating budget information:

Literacy Action Center - The Council funded this applicant in the amount of \$2,000. Their previous year's allocation of \$5,000 had not yet been billed. Housing and Neighborhood Development has contacted this applicant regarding this issue and is awaiting feedback. Their total operating budget is \$121,000. They rely on funding primarily from foundations and corporations (\$62,000 per year), as well as from individuals, special events, and fundraising.

Multi-Cultural Legal Center – The Council opted not to fund this program but raised a question about the operating budget. Their total operating budget is \$49,000. They were requesting that \$20,000 of this come from CDBG funding. The remainder is proposed to be funded from the IOLTA Bar Association (\$15,000), And Justice for All (\$6,000), and \$1500 from a fundraiser. In the original CDBG application, Multi-Cultural Legal Center stated that should they not receive CDBG funding, they would continue operations, but at a scaled back level.

ESG FUNDING SUMMARY

The Council elected to follow the Mayor's recommendations on funding levels for all applications in the Emergency Shelter Grant (ESG) program for a total funding allocation of \$179,118.

HOME FUNDING SUMMARY

The Council elected to follow the Mayor and CDAC's recommendations on funding levels for all applications in the HOME Investment Partnerships Program (HOME) for a total funding allocation of \$1,387,863.

HOPWA FUNDING SUMMARY

The Council elected to follow the Mayor's recommendations on funding levels for all applications in the Housing Opportunities for People with AIDS (HOPWA), with the exception of Housing Authority of Salt Lake City (the additional \$480 in funding came from recently re-captured funds) for a total funding allocation of \$423,167.

ADDI FUNDING SUMMARY

The Council elected to follow the Mayor and CDAC's recommendations on funding levels for all applications in the American Dream Downpayment Initiative (ADDI) for a total funding allocation of \$54,792.

Attached to the resolution is a detailed listing of specific project funding levels.

APPROPRIATION RESOLUTION ADOPTING THE FIVE-YEAR CONSOLIDATED PLAN FOR 2005-2010, WHICH INCLUDES THE ONE-YEAR ACTION PLAN FOR 2005-2006, AND THE CITIZEN PARTICIPATION PLAN FOR COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT BLOCK GRANT FUNDING, HOME INVESTMENT PARTNERSHIPS PROGRAM FUNDING, EMERGENCY SHELTER GRANT FUNDING, HOUSING OPPORTUNITIES FOR PERSONS WITH AIDS FUNDING AMERICAN DREAM DOWNPAYMENT INITIATIVE FUNDING (FISCAL YEAR 2005-06)

AND APPROVING INTERLOCAL COOPERATION AGREEMENT BETWEEN SALT LAKE CITY AND THE U.S. DEPARTMENT OF HOUSING AND URBAN DEVELOPMENT

WHEREAS, Salt Lake City is entitled under 24 Code of Federal Regulations (CFR), Part 91, et al., to receive Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds, HOME Investment Partnerships Program (HOME) funds, Emergency Shelter Grant (ESG) funds, Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA), and American Dream Downpayment Initiative (ADDI) funds from the U. S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD); and

WHEREAS; in order to receive said funds, the City is required to adopt a Five-Year Consolidated Plan and Citizen Participation Plan; and

WHEREAS, a public notice was published in two newspapers of general circulation in Salt Lake City and the Five-Year Consolidated Plan and Citizen Participation Plan were made available to the public for review and comment for thirty days; and

WHEREAS, Salt Lake City is entitled under 24 Code of Federal Regulations (CFR), Part 91, et al., to receive Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds in the amount of \$4,649,907, HOME Investment Partnerships Program (HOME) funds in the amount of \$1,373,848, Emergency Shelter Grant (ESG) funds in the amount of \$178,884, Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS (HOPWA) funds in the amount of \$354,000, and American Dream Downpayment Initiative (ADDI) in the amount of \$54,792 from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for program year 2005-06; and

WHEREAS, Salt Lake City will also reprogram: \$378,138 recaptured from prior year CDBG allocations; \$233.56 from prior year ESG allocations; \$14,015 from prior HOME allocations; and \$68,687.73 from prior year HOPWA allocations; and

WHEREAS, it is in the best interests of the people of Salt Lake City that the City file an application with HUD for said funds in accordance with 24 CFR Part 91; and

WHEREAS, the public notices, hearings, and other pre-submission requirements as set forth in 24 CFR Part 91 have been accomplished by the City, including but not limited to the following: A public hearing held March 15, 2005 to consider a proposed list of CDBG, HOME, ESG, HOPWA, and ADDI projects to be funded and to obtain the views of citizens regarding the City's One-year Action Plan; and

WHEREAS, the City Council does now meet this April 19, 2005 to adopt the City's 2005-2010 Consolidated Plan, which includes the 2005-2006 One-year Action Plan for CDBG, HOME, ESG, HOPWA, and ADDI funds, and Citizen Participation Plan;

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved by the City Council of Salt Lake City, Utah, as follows:

- 1. That the Five-Year Consolidated Plan for 2005-2010, which includes the 2005-2006 One-year Action Plan for CDBG, HOME, ESG, HOPWA, and ADDI funds and the Citizen Participation Plan for community planning and development programs for Salt Lake City, Utah as set forth in Exhibit "A" attached hereto and made a part hereof by this reference are adopted.
- 2. That the Mayor, as the official representative of Salt Lake City, is hereby authorized to submit the City's 2005-2006 One-Year Action Plan for CDBG, HOME, ESG, HOPWA, and ADDI funds together with such additional information and certifications as may be required under 24 CFR Part 91 to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.
- 3. That the Mayor, as the official representative of Salt Lake City, or his designee, is hereby authorized to sign and execute the HUD Grant Agreement and any and all subsequent agreements between the City and other public entities resulting from and consistent with the HUD Grant Agreement, subject to final approval as to form by the City Attorney.
