CURRENT COMPOSITION OF CIP BOARD:

City ordinance stipulates that the Capital Improvement Program Board will consist of a minimum of nine members who reside in the City and serve three-year terms. Current members include James Hector Alcala, District 2; Ben W. Burdett, District 7; Christine Daniels-Gardner, District 5; Pedro A. Gomez, District 3; Mitch Mills, District 6; Larry Myers, District 6; Orville Paller, District 1; Marilyn Pearson, District 1; Manuel Vorher, District 1; Kathleen R. Wheadon, District 7.

BOARD STRUCTURE:

Members of the Capital Improvement Program Board serve in an advisory role on decisions relating to the City's Capital Improvement Program. The Board is responsible to coordinate with the Capital Planning & Programming Division on the review and evaluation of current strategic planning, goals and policies of the capital improvement program; review all eligible annual and slippage or contingency project proposals submitted by various individuals, neighborhood groups, community organizations and City departments, and make recommendations to the Mayor on such requests for funds; discuss program and project monitoring information prepared by the City to ensure that the projects are implemented as planned; assure that capital improvement program goals are consistent with the strategic plans and goals of the City; evaluate the overall effectiveness of the capital improvement program activities; and establish and maintain communications with Salt Lake City's Community Councils.
