A. Decisions, Feedback & Information needed by staff

1. Regarding petition number 400-04-43, a request by Menlo Associates to close and abandon a portion of 300 South Street (between approximately 5100 and 5200 West). The other abutting property owner, South Farm LLC, came to the public hearing and objected to the street closure because it would eliminate access to their property. The Council voted to continue the hearing and directed the Planning Division to work with the two parties to resolve the issue. Discussions have been held but no agreement has been reached. The Planning Division then received a letter from the petitioner (Menlo) requesting to withdraw the petition, reserving the right to open the issue again in the future. The Council can either vote to close the hearing, which would mean the petitioner would have to file a new petition and pay another fee, or instruct the recorder's office to file the petition with the hearing still open. In the latter case, the petitioner would not have to pay another fee to re-open the issue in the future. What would the Council like to do?

GRANT DETAILS:

- Salt Lake City submitted a grant application requesting \$10,000 for the Salt Lake City Walking Tour. The project will result in a printed and on-line walking tour guide of the cemetery that is developed by middle and high school students from Judge Memorial Catholic High School, Juan Diego Catholic High School, and YouthCity. The youth will be instructed by their classroom teachers, Susan Crook and Associates Historical Landscape Architecture, archivist and local historian Jeff Johnson, and professional teaching artists from YouthCity.
- The youth will also produce a five to ten minute video of the cemetery and their experience learning about the history, culture, and landscape of the site. The video will be aired on SLC Channel 17 and www.slctv.com
- The goal of the project is to raise community awareness of the significance of the Salt Lake City Cemetery as an important a historical, cultural and environmental resource for the community.

SUBJECT: FY06 Appropriations Overview- House and Senate

DATE: October 12, 2005

Fiscal Year 2005 ended on September 30 and Congress passed a Continuing Resolution to fund the federal government through November 18. Congress is currently out for the Columbus Day week-long recess, but we have included below a summary of the appropriations process to date and specific information on Salt Lake City's FY06 priority projects. We have also included updated information on the current status of the various appropriations bills in the House and Senate.

For the first time in several years the full House passed all ten of its regular appropriations bills before the five-week summer recess. In addition, the FY06 Legislative Branch, the Interior and Environment and Homeland Security appropriations bills have been passed by the House and Senate and signed by the President. Within the Interior and Environment appropriation bill the City had requested funding for the Wasatch Canyons Watershed Land Acquisition Project and funding for a Secondary Water Re-use System for the Regional Sports Complex. Although worthy of funding, the two projects were not included in the final bill and the City may wish to propose the projects in its Fiscal Year 2007 federal priorities agenda.

In the four remaining bills which Salt Lake City has targeted the Science-State-Justice and Commerce, Transportation-Treasury-Housing and Urban Development, Labor-HHS-Education and Energy and Water the House and Senate will have to overcome a number of funding differences during conference negotiations. If Congress can maintain its steady pace on the remaining FY06 appropriations bills it is unlikely that they will have to pass an omnibus measure where a number of spending bills are consolidated into one large piece of legislation.

The Senate is expected to take up several spending bills on the floor in October. The only concern in moving all of the remaining appropriations measures to conference to prevent having to pass another Continuing Resolution will be setting aside enough time for floor consideration, given other priorities such as the Harriet Miers Supreme Court nomination and Hurricane Katrina recovery efforts.

Here is a quick overview of the status of Salt Lake City's FY06 requests.

Bill: Transportation-Treasury-HUD

Status: Passed by the full House on June 30th and is awaiting floor action in the Senate

Salt Lake City Priorities: Grant Tower Rail Curves, Utah Intermodal Transit Hubs, Streetcar- Downtown Rail Circulator

Salt Lake City Sponsors: Congressman Matheson, Congressman Bishop, Senator Bennett, Senator Hatch

The FY06 Transportation-Treasury-HUD appropriations bill passed the full House on June 30, 2005 and was approved by the Senate Appropriations Committee on July 21, 2005. It is expected that this bill will reach the Senate floor in October and then move to a conference committee following its passage by the Senate. There are no FHWA earmarks at this time and additional Economic Development Initiative and Bus and Bus Facility earmarks are expected to be added during conference negotiations. The inclusion of **\$3,000,000** for Utah Intermodal Hubs was a significant achievement and will further work already in progress. While both the EDI and Bus and Bus Facilities accounts are expected to grow appropriations subcommittee chairman in both the House and Senate have stated that many member priority project requests could not be satisfied within the Economic Development Initiative account because more funding was needed to limit the cuts to the Community Development Block Grant and other programs within HUD.

Bill: Labor-HHS-Education

Status: Passed full House June 16th, and passed Senate full Committee on July 14th

Salt Lake City Priority: Youth City: College Bound and Employment Project, Leonardo Center for the Arts, Science, and Culture, and the Museum of Utah Art & History

Salt Lake City Sponsors: Congressman Matheson, Congressman Bishop, Senator Bennett, Senator Hatch

The Labor-HHS-Education bill is one of the largest and most contentious of the domestic appropriations measures and does not contain any Member projects at this time. As in past years member priority projects will be added during conference negotiations. The Labor-HHS bill was one of the few appropriations bills to remain unchanged in its jurisdictional scope under the appropriations subcommittee reorganization in the 109th Congress.

Bill: Science-State-Justice and Commerce

Status: Passed full House June 16th, and passed full Senate on September 15th

Salt Lake City Priorities: Salt Lake City COPS Methamphetamine Initiative

Salt Lake City Sponsors: Congressman Matheson, Congressman Bishop, Senator Bennett, Senator Hatch

The Science-State-Justice and Commerce bill in the House contains soft earmarks at this time with the actual level of funding to be determined during conference negotiations later this year. The City's Methamphetamine Initiative was included in the House-passed bill as a soft earmark. The Senate bill is clean of all Justice earmarks at this time. We will continue to work closely with the entire Congressional delegation toward full funding of this project once Conference negotiations for the bill begin.

Bill: Energy and Water

Status: Passed the House on May 24th, passed the full Senate on July 1st

Salt Lake City Priority: Daylighting of City Creek

Salt Lake City Sponsors: Senator Bennett

The Energy and Water appropriations bill which passed the full Senate on July 1st did not contain any funding for the Daylighting of City Creek. Funding for the Army Corps has been tight over the last several years, though we expect additional projects to be added to the bill once it moves to conference with the House later this year. We will continue to work with Senator Bennett to see that this project is included in the final bill.

We will be keeping a very close eye on the appropriations process as it continues to move forward and on any progress toward final enactment this year.
