SUBJECT: Fire Permit Fees

The Fire Prevention Bureau conducts annual safety inspections of certain facilities such as health care businesses, high-rise buildings, and facilities where hazardous materials are stored or used. Permit fees are charged to cover both the direct and indirect cost of the inspection services. In 2005, the Administration conducted a review of business license fees and Fire Prevention Bureau inspection fees to identify the actual costs associated with providing these services. In May 2006, the Administration recommended increasing most of the fees based on the cost study. Although the Council didn't adopt most of the fee increases for business licensing, the proposed fire inspection fees were adopted in June 2006. One of the recommendations of the Council's audit of the Fire Department was to adjust the fees and adopt some new fees to recover more of the costs of providing inspection services.

Last fall, the Council started to receive inquiries and complaints regarding the increase to the fire inspection fees. As a result, Council Member Saxton accompanied a few inspections and found that some inspections were taking very little time to complete. Some inconsistencies were also noted. For example, the permit fee for small health-care facilities was the same as for much larger health-care facilities. The inspection of a backup generator required the same permit fee as the storage of hazardous materials.

In response to these complaints and inconsistencies, the Finance Division re-evaluated the study based on updated information from the Fire Prevention Bureau. The Administration is proposing a new fee schedule, which will reduce many of the inspection fees based on the revised study.

MATTERS AT ISSUE/POTENTIAL QUESTIONS FOR ADMINISTRATION

<u>More equitable scale for the business owners</u> – Some of the new permit fees are segregated by definable time delineation. For example, four tiers are proposed for inspection of a state licensed health care facility with fees based on the number of square feet of the facility. The annual inspection fee for places of assembly and the per-event fee for exhibits and trade shows are also tiered based on square footage. The inspection fee for high-rise buildings is proposed to be based on the number of floors. The fee for inspection of installation of suppression, alarm or detection systems is proposed to be \$95 per hour rather than 10% of the cost of the system.

<u>More specialized categories</u> – Some of the new proposed fees for hazardous materials permits are separated into more specialized categories. For example, a new separate permit is proposed for back-up generators, and a new permit is proposed for small body shops or repair garages under 5000 square fee rather than grouping these small shops with larger facilities.

<u>Refunds are proposed</u> – Since state law limits license fees to actual costs, the Administration is recommended that the ordinance be retroactive to July 1, 2006 with refunds of excess fees provided back to that date.

<u>Re-inspections</u> – The previous study included some re-inspection time into each permit fee. This penalized businesses that were in compliance during the initial inspection. Reinspection time was removed from the more recent cost study. The proposed re-inspection fee is \$20 for each 15 minutes of inspection time rather than the current re-inspection flat fee of \$240.

Administration and travel time - The previous study assumed two hours for administration and paperwork. However, administrative costs were also included in the calculation of the fully-loaded hourly rate. The new proposed fees now assume 30 minutes for paperwork. The previous study included one hour of travel time for each inspection. This time included the possibility of a re-inspection. Travel time was reduced in the new study to reflect the average time for a round trip of 30 minutes. Some business owners may continue to question the new fee amounts since the actual inspection time may be somewhat brief, while the proposed fees include an additional 60 minutes for paperwork and travel time. The Council may wish to ask representatives of the Fire Department whether new computer systems or software could reduce paperwork and better coordinate or schedule inspections to reduce travel.

<u>Fully loaded fees</u> – In addition to direct inspection time, permit fees are proposed to recover indirect costs including the fair value of rental of space in the Public Safety Building, a share of utilities for the Public Safety Building, depreciation of vehicles, risk management administration, and general fund administrative costs such as accounting, payroll, legal, city council and mayor. Because the fees are fully loaded, the hourly rate is calculated to be \$97.83 per hour. The actual salary and benefits of a fire inspector equates to an hourly rate of less than half of this fully-loaded rate. In the past, the Council has set some business license fees to recover only 75% of the actual costs. *The Council may wish to discuss whether it wishes to recover all of the indirect costs of fire inspection services through permit fees.*

<u>2006 International Fire Code</u> – Adjustments were also made to the fee structure to reflect changes to the 2006 International Fire Code, which was adopted by the State in January 2007. *The Council may wish to ask representatives of the Fire Department for additional explanation or examples of how the new International Fire Code impacted inspections or permits.*

<u>Budget impact</u> - The fee adjustment is estimated to impact the general fund annual budget by a decrease of \$123,000 in revenue. A budget amendment will not be necessary since some other revenues are in excess of budget and will offset this adjustment.

The following table compares the old fees with the current fees and with the proposed fees. (See proposed ordinance for more complete details.)

OPTIONS:

The Administration proposes that the Council adopt the new fee ordinance as proposed. The Council may wish to consider the following options:

- 1. Set the date for a public hearing.
- 2. Since most of the fees are decreasing from the current fee, forward to a future Council meeting for considering without a public hearing.
- 3. Request additional information or clarification regarding some of the permit fees.
- 4. Direct that the fee schedule reflect 75% of actual costs (or some other percentage).
- 5. Ask the Council's business licensing subcommittee members whether they wish to review supporting documentation and make recommendations to the Council.
- 6. Other options that may be identified by Council Members.

BUDGET IMPACT: This will result in a decrease in revenues of approximately \$123,000. This revenue has already been collected and a refund will need to be issued.

BACKGROUND/DISCUSSION: Last year the Fire Department, with the assistance of City Finance, reviewed all fees charged in the Fire Prevention Bureau. A new fee schedule was developed. During the budget process a new ordinance was adopted in accordance with the new fee structure. After some complaints from citizens the Fire Department and City Finance reviewed the updated fees. An updated fee structure has now been developed that will break down the fees to better match the needs of the citizens and businesses. This updated fee schedule is now being proposed as an ordinance. The ordinance is being proposed with an effective date of July 1, 2006. This will require that the Fire Department issue refunds to those who have paid for permits in accordance with the ordinance adopted in July of 2006

RECOMMENDATION:

It is proposed that the City Council adopt the new ordinance.

(Amending Business Permit Fees Collected by the Fire Prevention Bureau)

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 2.12.040, *SALT LAKE CITY CODE*, PERTAINING TO BUSINESS PERMIT.

WHEREAS, the City Council finds that the proposed ordinance is in the best interest of the City.

Now, Therefore, be it ordained by the City Council of Salt Lake City, Utah, as follows:

SECTION 1. That Section 2.12.040, *Salt Lake City Code*, pertaining to business permit fees be, and the same hereby is, amended to read as follows:

2.12.040 Business Permit Fees:

The city shall collect the following permit fees for each business activity regulated by the fire prevention bureau under the international fire code or other authority:
