BRIEF OVERVIEW:

The Administration has submitted an application for Land and Water Conservation Funds (LWCF) toward the restoration and completion of the Jordan River Parkway Trail between Redwood Road (at about 1800 North) and the Salt Lake City / Davis County boundary. The application requires documentation of the governing body's support in the form of meeting minutes and an adopted resolution. This step is requesting the Council's support of submitting the application, and committing to providing the matching funds for the remainder of the project in the event that the grant funds are awarded. *The Council may wish to discuss how matching funds will be handled, given the current budget situation, in the event that this grant is awarded.*

This project is also included in Budget Amendment No. 2, currently before the Council (Item E-9), for another grant received. See below for more detail on the sources of funding for this project.

KEY ELEMENTS:

This is the Salt Lake City portion of the same project listed as item E-9 in Budget Amendment No. 2, with each piece addressing different funding sources. The project area spans approximately one mile from Redwood Road (at about 1800 North) to the northern City boundary with Davis County. This is one of the final sections along the Jordan River Parkway within City boundaries to be completed. The planned project would include grading, constructing a ten foot wide paved pedestrian/bicycle path with a five foot soft trail for equestrian recreation, making improvements to existing river bridges, adding new railing, and constructing an elevated trail system over wetland areas.

The total amount estimated for this project is \$1,015,200. The Administration, through the Engineering Division and Trails Coordinator position, has applied for two different grants to secure funding for the project. One grant, which is addressed in Budget Amendment No. 2, Item E-9, has been received from the State's Department of Natural Resources, and is shared with Davis County. This present request refers to a LWCF grant application for only the Salt Lake City portion of the trail. The funding break down is as follows:

In addition, Davis County was awarded another portion of the State's Natural Resources Grant – as mentioned in Budget Amendment No. 2. Davis County's total portion is \$338,547, including their portion of the grant money (\$65,000). Therefore, in total, \$1,353,747 will be applied to the construction between Redwood Road and the Legacy Highway trail in Davis County.

The Administration submitted a CIP application for the 2009-10 year for \$650,000 to complete the project. If the LWCF grant is awarded, that request could be reduced by the award amount.

The proposed resolution for the Council to consider commits that matching funds will be allocated in the event that this grant is awarded to Salt Lake City. *Does the Council wish to clarify how the Administration will approach this project if the additional funds anticipated either from the CIP or the Grant are not available in the coming year?*

Restoration and completion of sections along the Jordan River Parkway is supported in the Salt Lake City Bicycle and Pedestrian Master Plan, Open Space Plan, and the Salt Lake County Trails Master Plan. This also supports other projects such as the Legacy Parkway Trail, the Bonneville Shoreline Trail, City Creek, and Parley's Rails and Trails (PRATT).

According to the Administration, there are still three other sections within City boundaries that need to be completed along the trail.

- 1. "Redwood Road to Rose Park Golf Course. Funding has been obtained. Construction for this section has been bid and will be completed summer 2009.
- 2. "200 South to Alzheimer's park (going under I-80). Funding has been obtained. This section will go out for construction bid this in early February and will be constructed this winter/spring.
- 3. "North Temple to 200 South. No funding has been obtained. We are in the planning stage for this section which crosses three mainline Union Pacific railroad tracks. A CIP application was submitted fall 2008 for design."

OPTIONS:

The Administration has prepared a resolution for the Council's consideration, which indicates the Council's support for submitting the application, and commits to funding the match portion of the project. If the Council chooses to support the application, and the grant funds are awarded, the Administration would bring this item back in a future budget amendment to allocate the grant funds.

This item can be placed on the February 3 agenda under Unfinished Business for the Council's consideration of the resolution.

DISCUSSION:

Issue Origin: During October 2008, City Staff prepared and submitted an application for a Utah State Parks and Recreation Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) Matching Grant. The LWCF program requires that program grant recipients provide a 50/50 funding match for approved projects. As part of the application, meeting minutes from a legal meeting of the applicant are required showing that the application is being submitted by official action of the governing body, that the applicant has resources to finance its share of the project cost, and that

the applicant will bear the cost of operation and maintenance of the completed project. There is no cost to the City unless the grant is received; a request for matching funds would be handled through a future budget amendment or budget request. The State allowed the City to submit our application before this legal meeting was held but will not process the application until we fulfill this requirement. Likewise, the Mayor's Office will not sign the application until this last application requirement is completed. Adoption of the proposed resolution (see Attachment A) will fulfill this requirement.

Analysis: Salt Lake City's LWCF grant application proposes to construct a shared use trail along 5,400 lineal feet (LF) of the Jordan River between Redwood Rd (1800 North) and the Salt Lake City boundary with Davis County. The trail will consist of 4,200 LF of 10' paved trail, 1,200 LF of elevated trail constructed over existing wetlands and an adjacent 5' soft trail for equestrians. An existing river bridge will also receive upgrades including a new railing. This is a high priority project and one of the last sections of the Jordan River Parkway Trail within the city needing to be built.

The LWCF application is attached (see Attachment B). The application requests project funding for \$645,200 which, if approved, translates into a LWCF grant of \$322,600 and a required city match of \$322,600. A detailed cost estimate for the project is given in the application. In summary, the total project cost is estimated to be \$1,015,200, current approved funding is \$370,000 (½ city funds and ½ State Trails Grant) and funding still needed is \$645,200.

Master Plan Considerations: The Jordan River Parkway Trail is a part of state, county, and local plans to complete a network of trails throughout the region. The completion of this section will connect trails in the Salt Lake City Bicycle and Pedestrian Master Plan, the Salt Lake City Open Space Plan and the Salt Lake County Trails Master Plan to the Davis County trail system including the Legacy Parkway Trail.

A RESOLUTION OF THE SALT LAKE CITY COUNCIL SUPPORTING SUBMISSION OF APPLICATION TO THE LAND AND WATER CONSERVATION FUND PROGRAM

WHEREAS, Congress annually appropriates funding for the Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) program to provide for matching grants to state and local governments for recreation planning, acquisition and development; and

WHEREAS, all applications are reviewed and the projects are ranked through an evaluation process that has been cooperatively developed by the Utah Division of State Parks and Recreation and the National Park Service; and

WHEREAS, the LWCF program requires that program grant recipients provide a 50/50 funding match for approved projects; and

WHEREAS, as a requirement of the LWCF application, meeting minutes from a legal meeting of the applicant must be submitted demonstrating that the application is being submitted by official action of the governing body, the applicant has resources to finance its share of the project cost, and the applicant will bear the cost of operation and maintenance of the completed project; and

WHEREAS, the City's Transportation Division, in October 2008, submitted an application to the LCWF program to construct a shared use trail along the Jordan River between Redwood Road (at approximately 1800 North) and the Salt Lake City boundary with Davis County; and

WHEREAS, the City's application requests project funding for \$645,200 which, if approved, translates into a LWCF grant of \$322,600 and a required city match of \$322,600; and

WHEREAS, the Utah Division of State Parks and Recreation allowed the City to submit its application without the required meeting minutes but will not process the application until this requirement is fulfilled; and

WHEREAS, the Salt Lake City Council supports the City's efforts to complete construction of the Jordan River Parkway Trail within Salt Lake City.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Salt Lake City Council that the Mayor be authorized to submit an LWCF application to the Utah Division of State Parks and Recreation for the construction of a shared use trail along the Jordan River between Redwood Road (at approximately 1800 North) and the Salt Lake City boundary with Davis County, within Salt Lake City.

1. PROGRAM NARRATIVE AND PROJECT JUSTIFICATION STATEMENT

A. Objective and Need for Assistance: Describe the proposed project. Discuss the objective of the project and how it relates to local recreation issues, needs and problems. Indicate the relationship between the project and local planning and/or needs assessment.

The project will complete one of the final sections of the Jordan River Parkway Trail within Salt Lake City and is in accordance with the Memorandum of Understanding with the State of Utah Division of Parks and Recreation, to develop a trail along the Jordan River. Salt Lake City will construct 5,400 lineal feet (LF) of shared used trail consisting of 4,200 LF of 10' paved trail, 1,200 LF of trail deck over an existing wetland area and an adjacent 5' soft trail. An existing river bridge will also receive upgrades including a new railing. The trail will be used for both recreation and commuting by pedestrians, bicyclists and equestrians.

The Jordan River Parkway Trail is a part of state, county, and local plans to complete a network of trails throughout the region. The completion of this section will connect trails in the Salt Lake City Bicycle and Pedestrian Master Plan, the Salt Lake City Open Space Plan and the Salt Lake County Trails Master Plan to the Davis County trail system. Completion of the city's portion of the parkway trail provides connections to the Legacy Parkway Trail, Great Western Trail, Bonneville Shoreline Trail, City Creek Trail, Parley's Trail (PRATT Trail), Airport Trail and Salt Lake City's extensive on-street bike lanes. Northwest Middle School and the Day Riverside Library will be connected to the larger trail system providing access to students and patrons, as well as access points for public recreational use.

B. Recreation Participation Benefits: Discuss local recreation programs and how this project may benefit these programs. Include information on potential users, cross-section of population served, and time of year when the facilities will be used.

The Jordan River Parkway Trail is a paved shared use facility providing opportunities for bicycling, jogging, hiking, horseback riding, fishing, in-line skating, and nature viewing. The trail follows the Jordan River for 44 miles between Utah Lake and the Great Salt Lake. The section of the trail within Salt Lake City's jurisdiction totals approximately 9 miles. Since the trail experiences little elevation change it is well suited for use by people of all ages and experience levels. The trail within Salt Lake City is plowed during the winter providing year around access for trail users.

Positive outcomes from the Jordan River Parkway Trail include expanded recreational opportunities for Salt Lake City residents and tourists and the development of alternative modes of urban transportation thereby improving air quality and reducing our demand on fossil fuels. The Jordan River Parkway Trail project also involves stream bank restoration and revitalization efforts that are commensurate with the City's environmental and ecosystem conservation activities. Construction of the elevated path through the wetlands preserves and contributes to the restoration of the delicate eco-system.




